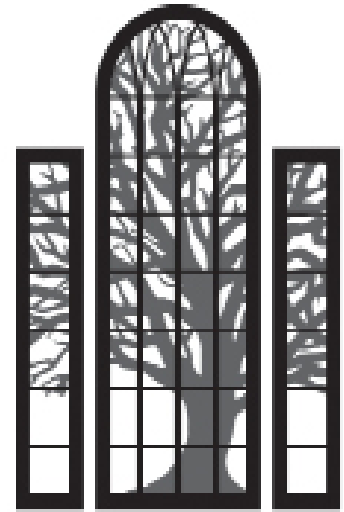

Gabriel Faure's Requiem

At the 11:00 service on October 30, UPC will celebrate All Saint's Day with a performance of Faure's beautiful and moving Requiem, sung by our choir with soloists Stephen Rushing, baritone, and Katie Rothstein, soprano. The Requiem Mass began as a tradition of the Roman Catholic Church, comprising specific prayers for the repose of the dead. It gets its name from the first line: *Requiem aeternam dona eis, Domine* (Grant them eternal rest, O Lord).

The Requiem service has inspired many musical compositions. Over time, and across denominations outside of the Catholic Church, and even outside of any liturgical setting, the Requiem has taken on a variety of texts suitable for funerals or for the remembrance of the departed. Gabriel Faure's Requiem is particularly notable for replacing the text *Dies Irae* (Day of Wrath) with the prayer *Pie Jesu* (Pious Jesus). He wrote that his Requiem "is dominated from beginning to end by a very human feeling of faith in eternal rest."

Join us as we celebrate and remember our brothers and sisters who have left us in the past year, and all of those whom we remember on this day.

CUBA CORNER

On the first full day of our trip to Cuba, we were greeted with a traditional kiss on the cheek from members of a nearby church in Manguito. We sat down in the pews and introduced ourselves. When it was my turn, I mustered up enough fake confidence to say: "Me yammo Rachel, tango dies-ee-ocho." I looked to our translator, Melissa, and said "I like to knit." Once she translated what I said, a woman in the back of the church named Mary Elisa perked up and said something to Melissa about how she liked to knit, too. I was happy to know that my hobby was something that I shared with someone from Cuba but I didn't think much of it.

Mary Elisa and I talked later on about our love for knitting and crocheting. For me, it is no hobby but in fact an obsession or more kindly put, a life style. Her face lit up when it became clear that our love was the same. Mary Elisa walked Elisabeth, Mary Anne, and me to her home through the little town. We had no translator and the only one of us who'd had any exposure to the language before was Elisabeth, and she'll tell you that class learning doesn't quite cut it in the real world. The most conversation we had was limited to how hot it was and most of that was head nods and hand gestures.

We reached her house where she sat me down in her special rocking chair covered in foam pads in front of the television. I knew just what it was because I have one exactly like it at home. She began pulling out her supplies and bags to show me what she was working on. I wanted to show her my understanding and happiness, so I decided to stick with the smiles and nods but bigger this time. Then she went behind the staircase and came out with a beautiful white lacelike tablecloth. The awe was apparent on my face, and then she said "por tu." I looked over at Elisabeth to confirm what I'd just heard and she nodded with shock in her eyes and said "It's for you!"

The levels of shock and adoration were so high that I couldn't wipe a smile off of my face. *Muchas gracias* just didn't cut it for how I felt but I hoped that if I at least said it a lot she'd understand. While I was admiring my gift she pulled out a shirt for Mary Anne and a purse for Elisabeth.

On the walk back to the church we ran into Melissa and I had her tell Mary Elisa all of what I wanted to be able to say myself. I thanked her and told her, "It was amazing and I will cherish it forever!" Mary Elisa said, looking a little bashful, "Hopefully it will remind you of the love of the Cuban people." She continued, "We could have gone anywhere else in the world, but we chose Cuba and we chose to share ourselves with them."

While in Cuba we experienced the love that Mary Elisa was talking about. The care simply put into our meals was astounding, and the fact that a woman I'd only met twenty minutes ago was bringing me to her home to share her passion with me was beyond amazing. Our connection with Cuba, and particularly San José is one which can never be fully explained without actually going there and experiencing it for yourself. We were welcomed with kisses and open arms. The pure hospitality that we were shown made us all realize the true value of something like a shower or a piece of mayonnaise and bread. The love was apparent when we met these people, and we didn't need a translator to tell us that. To anyone else, this would have just been an old woman giving them a piece of cloth, but to me it was a woman giving me a piece of her life. From my experience, projects of this caliber don't come quickly or easily. What seemed like such a simple gesture changed my whole day and the entire trip. Once you share a part of yourself with someone else it becomes twice as special. If you can take a passion and translate it into a way to make someone else feel welcome and special, then we're on our way to making the world a bit more open, a bit more special, and just a little bit smaller.
