I met last night with the Task Group that is looking at our organizational structure as a result of the Moving Forward process we've been in for more than a year now. They are working faithfully and hard. The lenses through which the Session encouraged all of us to think about every step of this process came up in the discussion. Those lenses are God's call to us, stewardship, and leadership. You can read a bit more about them in an article on page eight of this edition of *Contact*. These lenses are certainly important to any change, including change to our organizational structure, that we might move toward. After a bit, though, the particular goals of the group's conversations about structure came up and then they were off like lightning, honing down what they are trying to accomplish. They are still in process but one of the goals they came up with struck me as particularly wise and has stuck with me.

One of the goals they articulated last night is avoiding over organization, otherwise known by that axiom "keep it simple, stupid." Of course, this group's members are certainly not stupid but bring great gifts to their task, and neither is the ministry of this lively congregation simple. But it is incredibly easy to fall into the thinking that more is always better - more layers of structure, more specific requirements or expectations, more regularity to how we do things. Of course, there's a theological and spiritual element to this as well.

Recently I've re-read the spiritual classic *A Testament of Devotion* by Thomas Kelly. It is a very short text of great depth that has withstood almost a century of readers and changes in the world. In it, paraphrasing Oliver Wendall Holmes*, Kelly refers to the simplicity on the other side of complexity when it comes to our faith and how we live it out. There is so much wisdom in that thought – wisdom for our lives of faith and wisdom for how we do things.

This morning I found myself contemplating how we might best embody – and even organize ourselves around - in our life together as the body of Christ in this place - some of the things that are on the other side of complexity? Things like:

Acceptance/Welcome/Inclusion/Collegiality

Kindness/Love/Patience/Forgiveness

Encouragement/Permission/Space for creativity and mistakes/Vulnerability

How might we make a container, if you will, of our shared life that can make space for these things?

Sometimes in the midst of planning, thinking, questioning, organizing, working, and doing, these things get downplayed or even forgotten. Judging by the excitement on the faces at the meeting last night, I doubt that will happen this time.

Our Board of Deacons under their new call will be preparing this summer for a start up of the new program in the fall! Watch this space for more news!




Pentecost Sunday, June 9 At University Presbyterian Church

The Shower of Stoles Project is an extraordinary collection of liturgical stoles and other sacred items representing the lives of lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender (LGBT) people of faith. These religious leaders have served in over thirty denominations and faith traditions and come from six countries on three continents.

This collection celebrates the gifts of LGBT persons who serve God in countless ways while also lifting up those who have been excluded from service because of their sexual orientation or gender identity. The Project bears witness to the huge loss of leadership that the Church has brought upon itself because of its own unjust policies. The collection tours constantly around the country, being exhibited in local congregations, universities and seminaries, and regional and national denominational gatherings.

Plastic Bag Collection Drive

LSU is hosting the annual conference of the National Association of College and University Residence Halls (NACURH) in early June. As a philanthropy project, the participants at the conference will cut and weave plastic bags into plastic mattresses for the homeless; The conference organizers have asked us to participate in a plastic bag drive to generate materials for their project and we have agreed. We believe that collecting and recycling plastic bags are important steps towards reducing garbage and caring for God's creation.

We are also aware of our need to continue striving to be better stewards of the earth's resources. We need to stop buying goods in throwaway packaging and yes, ultimately, we need to stop using plastic bags. But until we've all reached that point, we will gladly collect your plastic bags so that they may be recycled for this worthy cause – namely, to weave mattresses for the homeless. There is a box in the hallway for you to deposit your plastic bags. The collection will continue until May 15. Thank you for cooperating with us in caring for God's creation.

Together Baton Rouge Update...

Together Baton Rouge held its annual Delegates Assembly this past March at University Baptist Church with over 300 attendees representing 35 Member Institutions, including delegates from UPC. The focus of the Assembly was commitment to a summer Civic Academy campaign in each institution to deepen relationships with each other and TBR (and to broaden our institutional base) surrounding issues and initiatives at the heart of TBR's mission. These Academies include Criminal Justice and local Police Reform, Health Care and Healthy Food Access, Education, and Economic Development, as well as exploratory Academies around Early Childhood Education, the Flood, and TBR itself.

So just what is a Civic Academy? Essentially an Academy is a gathering of people who have a common concern about an issue affecting Baton Rouge. It starts by asking what got us to this point (with a research-driven presentation), then asking us to share stories about how and why it may affect us, our friends & family, and our community. Through these stories, we act institutionally and organizationally with the other faith-based and civic institutions of Together BR.

At the Assembly, our delegates committed to sponsor a Civic Academy for June 30th on Health Care and Healthy Food Access---so be on the lookout for upcoming information regarding Academy details.

Meanwhile, TBR has been actively engaged in the current legislative session, specifically organizing to keep decisions regarding the Industrial Tax Exemption Program in the hands of local decision-making bodies, an initiative TBR worked with Governor Edwards to support beginning in 2016. TBR also plans to organize Citizen Assemblies later this year in preparation for the upcoming Gubernatorial and Legislative elections. Though TBR has been here now for nearly nine years, many UPC members haven't. This is a great year to get involved, to deepen ties with our sister congregations and our relationships with each other. Check the weekly and monthly calendar for upcoming events.

Moving Forward

LENSES THROUGH WHICH WE SEE

Just as a refresher.....these are the lenses through which all of our work in Moving Forward is being viewed. As we move toward a new model of work for the Diaconate, search for a second called pastor, and consider a reorganization of how we are organized they seem timely to remember...

A. God's Call

Our call from God, to quote our mission statement, is "In response to God's grace, University Presbyterian Church of Baton Rouge seeks creatively – through nurture, education, worship and community outreach – to sustain an inclusive, compassionate family of faith; it seeks to promote spiritual growth by awakening souls to God's infinite mercy embodied in the reconciling love of Christ." All of the work of the Moving Forward process is an effort to follow the call of the Spirit of Christ. Sometimes this means identifying the systems, traditions, expectations, and fears that keep us from attending to that call. It also means surrounding our work together with prayer, seeking to embody our mission goals and the spirit of the gospel in the community life we are living into, and considering, in our common life as the church, ways we can find the intersection of our place of deep gladness and the world's deepest hunger.

B. Stewardship

In essence, stewardship is the ways in which a person or a community uses gifts of material goods, abilities, and time in faithful response to God's self-giving in Jesus Christ and Christ's call to minister and share with others in the world. ² UPC is greatly gifted. The abundance of experience, passion, faith, expertise, and financial resources within our community of members and friends is astounding. The Moving Forward process is an opportunity to be intentional about the stewardship of those individual gifts in our corporate life. There are also limits that need to be acknowledged. For some those limits are related to time, for others to financial resources, for others finding ways for gifts to be used, and for others not getting burned out. We are encouraged to consider even more broadly than before both what our gifts are and how best to focus their use. This may include fresh avenues of ministry and organization. It also may include letting go of things that are not the best use of our resources. All of this goes hand in hand with our discernment of call and a belief that God's Spirit can "do far more abundantly than we can ask or think." ³

C. Leadership

Leadership, of course, has to do with who will do what. Will certain tasks be taken on by a committee, a pastor, a staff person, by an individual member of the community, or a small group of members and visitors? But leadership is more than simply who is in what role and the assignment of duties. Leadership also has to do with vision, with – as the questions for officer ordination in our Book of Order put it – "energy, imagination, and love." As each of the themes is considered it is important to have in the back of our minds who might provide leadership for new initiatives or changes in our life together. Who is poised to rally folks around an idea? Who sees opportunities that others might miss? Are there folks who have gifts or passions that match our calling but that have gone untapped? Of course these questions go hand in hand with the questions about call and stewardship and are still very much at the forefront of our life together in this moment!
