From My Window

Dearest ones,

Is it just me or did some of you take note that it was just as we were entering Lent that we were inundated with cold and ice incredibly unusual for South Louisiana? The weather resulted in many being without the essentials...power, light, water, and warmth. And finding ourselves struggling for restful sleep and ways to prepare food. The disproportionate hardship this placed on people already living on the edge is not to be trivialized nor should the corporate decisions that may have enhanced that hardship – not just in Texas - be ignored. But coupled with the staggering deaths of more than 500,000 Americans due to COVID and almost 2 million globally, it sure seemed like a teachable moment for those of us entering a season of deep reflection about the infrastructure, the state of our souls, our lives. It was a moment when we were reminded of the importance of the essentials.

Our community this Lent will be turning again and again to the covenant stories in the biblical texts. These covenants are the foundations of our relationships with God, with one another, and with the creation. They call us to reflect on the sources and nature of our power and our vulnerability, the quality of the light that makes our hearts flourish, the waters that bring new life, the warmth that we need and receive from sharing. This season opens a neighborly door to practices that might deepen the restfulness of our souls and give us renewed sources of sustenance for the days in which we live.

I know, sometimes Lenten “disciplines” can feel – particularly this year - like a burden, like one (or 10) more things to feel guilty about not doing! And so it bears repeating, Lent doesn’t have to be a competition. It is not meant to be a piling up of expectations. It can be restorative and even freeing to invite new little practices into our lives. As similarly, in an odd way, it renews something in us to focus on the essentials of life for ourselves and others – on power, light, water, rest, food – during and after a storm.

So I’m wondering, what practices, thought processes, or little rituals might become infused with a new mindfulness this Lent? It’s not, nor ever, too late. Perhaps for you it could be taking a moment each evening as you load the dishwasher to look at the prism spinning in your kitchen window and ponder what gave you light that day? Or, in the shower, spending your thoughts on washing away mental ruts that trap you? Perhaps it could be noticing when one of the devotional words in the bags delivered to our homes seems to touch a chord, nourishing and stirring something. And then just staying with that word, perhaps even for the whole season. Holding it up to the light in your heart. Perhaps it’s something like going slowly enough to take note when someone or something ignites in you a warmth of spirit and then asking for cracks in your own routines in order to share warmth with someone else?

These little kinds of things are essential, essential to life as it was meant to be, no less than literal power, light, water, rest, and food. May our eyes and hearts be open to them.

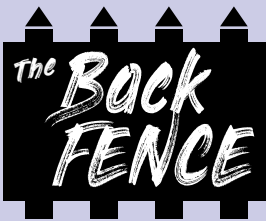

Mission & Peacemaking

The Sthreshleys: Mission Co-Workers in the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC)

In pursuit of human rights and economic justice around the world, UPC continues to support the mission work of the Sthreshleys. Larry and Inga Sthreshley have been PCUSA mission co-workers in the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC) for more than 30 years. They are staff of the Interchurch Medical Assistance (IMA), a faith based global non-profit. Larry directs one of the largest church-run health programs in Africa and assists the government to provide medical care to people in over 800 health centers and hospitals in four provinces of the country. Inge works on the nutrition, home garden and clean cook stove component of the program.

Here is an update of their mission work:

According to a report in the fall 2020 issue of Mission Crossroads, a major focus of Larry Sthreshley's current work is COVID-19. Sthreshley has experience with global pandemics, most recently Ebola. He praised the government's quick action in closing the borders, schools and nonessential stores as early as August 2020 but because COVID-19 is more contagious than Ebola, they have had to exclude the door to door visitation and temperature monitoring strategies used with Ebola, and limit their community efforts to identifying cases, and distributing educational materials and masks to contacts. While the population is younger than in Western cities with 62% of the population under 25, The impact of COVID-19 is still expected to be significant; there is a high incidence of diabetes and hypertension and there are thousands of children suffering from acute and chronic malnutrition. The nine Presbyterian health facilities in the capital city benefit from Grants to IMA; the funds are used for medical treatment, and to purchase personal protective equipment and messaging on how to protect from COVID-19.

Inge Sthreshley's nutrition program includes working with "community animators" who travel throughout the provinces teaching communities and community volunteers about best infant feeding and home gardening practices. This program was implemented in Maniema province with success (Mission Connections, October 2020). The goal of the program is to overcome and prevent malnutrition using available resources. Interventions include teaching home gardening, how to make enriched porridge, and how to use powder made from Moringa leaves to enrich children's foods. Colored bands are provided to measure Mid Upper Arm Circumference (MUAC) to determine if a child is adequately nourished. Community volunteers are trained how to use the bands as a malnutrition screening tool. The introduction of feeding and gardening practices in Maniema province resulted in a decline in malnutrition from 13.8% in 2015 to 3.7% in 2020, based on systematic MUAC screenings. We are pleased to provide continued support to the Sthreshleys for their important work.

Bedding and Detergent Drive for IRIS during Lent

The Mission & Peacemaking Committee is spearheading a donation drive to benefit Iris Domestic Violence Center of Baton Rouge to meet their increased need for bedding and laundry detergent due to COVID19. The Center is experiencing more rapid turnover of their families due to the stress and pressures of the pandemic. In addition, to reduce the likelihood of transmission of Covid19, bedding is often given to guests when they depart Iris, and all laundry at the Center is washed with greater frequency than in pre-pandemic times.

If you are able to donate new or gently used queen-sized bedding, blankets, or laundry detergent, you will find a drop-off box in the front hallway at UPC every Wednesday during Lent. Donated items will be taken to the facility by Melanie Driscoll as they accumulate, to keep up with the ongoing need. The staff at Iris have been working hard to keep themselves and the residents protected, and are grateful for all we have done and are willing to contribute to their mission during this challenging time.



Braver Angels Virtual Workshops Thursday, May 9, 9 – noon

In our current polarized political environment, many of us avoid or dread political conversations with friends or family members whose politics differ from their own. Attend one or both workshops to increase your skills in dealing with tough conversations. Braver Angels is a national organization dedicated to overcoming polarization.

Leader: John Fletcher is the Billy J. Harbin Associate Professor of Theatre at Louisiana State University. He studies social change performance and online disinformation/ misinformation.

1) Depolarizing Within Tuesday, March 16, 6 - 8:30 p.m. (RSVP)

Designed to foster skills to help you lessen the effects of polarization when you encounter them in your political conversations. Polarization refers to how we regard and talk about large groups of ordinary people on the other side of the political aisle.

2) Skills for Bridging the Divide Saturday, March 20, 3 - 4:30 p.m. (RSVP)

Designed to teach skills for having respectful conversations that clarify differences, search for common ground, and affirm the importance of the relationship. They also give participants a safe environment to practice those skills.

- Children and Youth participated in Lent preparations for Wilderness by Sanctified Art.
- Session approved name change from Christian Education to Faith Formation.
- March thru December (2020): Covid Shut down required new approaches for Faith Formation.
- Adult classes, Bible Studies and small groups were held virtually on Zoom. The Parks Wilson lectures were recorded for the UPC Facebook Page.
- Because everyone was overwhelmed with the virtual we attempted to maintain contact with children and youth in other ways.
 1. Porch delivery of 26 Faith Formation Activity Bags which included projects, supplies and ideas for 44 children. The themes for the fall bags of hope, joy, love and peace coordinated with Worship. Senior High Youth assisted with delivery one month.
 2. Reading of children's books were posted on the UPC Facebook Page.
 3. Rally Day included donuts added to Activity Bag porch delivery.
 4. Parking Lot Trick or Treat with costumes was held.
 5. We requested that Worship be intentional about including children and youth in Worship.
 6. "Journey to Bethlehem" planned for the parking lot instead was filmed separately and posted on the UPC Facebook Page.
 7. Poinsettias were porch delivered to the congregation to connect at Christmas.
- Intergenerational Mission Trip to Guatemala was postponed to June 2021. Courtney held some zooms with youth.

Personnel & Administration Committee

P&A held four committee meetings during the year. Committee members were Clarence Bahs, Gaines Foster, Steven Hartmann (chair), Cordell Haymon, Gus Rowland, Patti Snyder, Caralyn Durham, and Janet Whyde. The following is a list of the Committee's activities during 2020:

- Formed a subcommittee to identify and interview candidates for the position of Choir Director following Stuart Dameron's move to Colorado. This resulted in the recommendation and hiring of David Walters.
- Met with the Stewardship & Finance Committee to discuss the financial feasibility of funding a second pastor position in light of COVID-19.
- Conducted a study of personnel spending levels in other PC(USA) churches across the country and how spending varies based on the pastor model utilized.
- Reviewed the P&A Listing of Job Responsibilities for ed-its and asked other committees to do the same.
- Oversaw the transition to the co-pastor model: Betsy Irvine stepped down from her position as Interim Parish Associate and Courtney Dumas stepped down from her position as Children and Youth Ministry Coordinator following the congregation call of Mamie Broadhurst to the position of Co-Pastor.
- Added Mamie to the PC(USA) Board of Pensions benefits system.
- Made revisions to the Personnel Policy Manual to reflect the co-pastor model.

In 2020, UPC changed pastoral models and saw changes to staff, all while adjusting to the new realities of COVID-19. This made for an especially challenging year. The Committee Chair greatly appreciates the consistent attendance by Committee members and their follow through on assignments.

Worship Schedule: Until mid-March we had only one service at 11 am on Sundays until we have a second pastor. Once the pandemic hit BR, we moved to online worship on FB via Zoom at 11 am on Sundays. The technical aspects of this have been coordinated by Tavia Crumpler. Patti prepares the worship schedule seasonally and then committee discusses. Previously we moved to one service at 10 am during the summer months but we kept worship at 11 am to have some sense of regularity for 2020.

Preaching: Patti Snyder preached regularly with Betsy Irvine preaching every two months and at least one guest preacher. Taize: The first Wednesday evening at 6 each month until the lockdown. We thereafter directed the congregation to the live

Day School Committee

Submitted to Session by Linda Benedict, chair

2020 was a year of distress for the UPC Day School but also a year that demonstrated the talent, dedication and managerial skills of the Day School director and her staff.

- The UPC Day School was closed for three months—the end of March until the middle of June—because of the pandemic. It opened again on June 15 with a comprehensive plan developed with the assistance of the Louisiana Department of Education for protocols, procedures and actions in dealing with COVID-19. At no time during 2020 was a child or teacher infected with the disease, although a few had to quarantine from exposure.
- The Day School was at 85% capacity before the shutdown. After the reopening in June, the attendance hovered at 40%, and then for the fall, participation went to about 50% and stayed there for the remainder of the year as the state went from Phase 2 to Phase 3 and then back to Phase 2.
- Despite the financial strain caused by the pandemic, the Day School was able to keep its budget balanced with roughly the same amount of money going in that went out. During the year, the Day School director applied for and received more than \$45,000 in grants from the LDE, which helped make this financial stability possible. The church also received a PPP loan to help with personnel costs.
- During the year, the Day School was awarded a high proficiency rating by the LDE, based on evaluations in 2019. This rating is equivalent to level 3 in a four-level system. The highest level is the excellent rating, which the Day School is committed to achieving as soon as the pandemic is over.

Taize services on FB. Previously we also had Taize services each Wednesday during Lent and Advent.

Communion: We regularly serve communion on the first Sunday of the month. We ask Session for special Sundays, like Easter or Pentecost. We served gluten-free bread and grape juice in order to be inclusive. That is, until the lock down. We continue to have monthly communion on our FB services.

Readers: Tavia Crumpler recruited and coordinated.

Liturgists: AmyBeth Mainord recruited and coordinated for the year.

Music: After the pandemic, soloists and some small groups recorded both at home and in the sanctuary. Anne recorded organ music in the sanctuary. When David Walters began working as our choir director, we had octets recording some choral music and leading hymns. In November we again reduced our numbers and allow up to four singers with masks to record our weekly worship music. The choir has attempted to meet via Zoom every other week with some variance.

Budget Request: Reduced for 2021 due to pandemic.

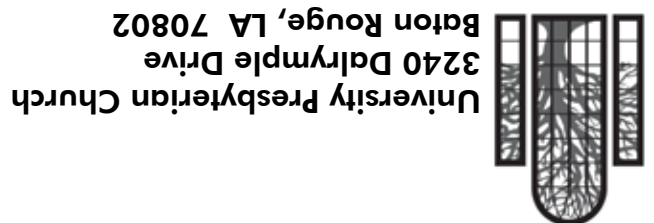
