True confession of a staunch "Adventer" - I love hearing Christmas music this time of year. Yes, before Christmas! Not in church so much, but my car radio is on go! One of my favorites is "There's no Place Like Home for the Holidays."

This year we will be asking ourselves "Adventy" questions in worship - What are you waiting for? How could you keep watch? What do you wonder about God? How have you experienced welcome? As I ponder, particularly that last question, others are brought to mind.

What is home for you? Is it a place? A group of people or a person? A feeling? A memory? We often refer to UPC as our "church home" but some of us don't have much of an experience of church being home. For some of us church is more like looking in through a window at someone else's home. Some of us experience anxiety about who we will talk with as everyone hangs out after worship, are self-conscious about our questions about faith, or are worried about how loud or active our kids might be.

The anxiety can fade with a few kind gestures from others and the questions can find a place where none of us shy from them, for we all have questions. And as for the kids... I'd suggest that kids often lead the way in showing us how to make church our home.

Recently I read an article published by an arm of the Virginia Theological Seminary (<u>buildfaith</u>. <u>org/feral-church-children-why-kids-need-to-hang-out-at-church/</u>) that calls these kids "feral church kids" and reminds us that kids and I suggest, grown ups too, need time to "just be" at church. The author reminds that being at church not for a specific purpose but just to hang out, to be bored, to poke around, helps kids form relationships and community. She goes on, "I tell families, of course you should worship with your children. By all means, bring your kids to Sunday school. But, if you can swing it, find the time after the service to just "be" at church. Take time for another cup of coffee. Assist with preparing communion or leading worship. Linger a bit longer after a parish meal. Attend an adult education offering. While you're taking time to be a member of your church community and building a home, your kids are hanging out at church... and getting something out of it.

I'm reminded of the kids helping to set up for Advent last Sunday or rolling around on the grass in the courtyard during our Courtyard Adventures last year, helping with the "little kids" in church school or just hanging out in the library, engaging in sleeping bag races at a youth group lock in or standing around the donuts on Sunday mornings, Michael Purser curling up for a nap in the pew, or Mary Collier Wilks falling asleep after one Sunday service on the floor in the pulpit! All of this suggests a sense of "this is my place," "these are my people," "I am at home here."

So how can we make UPC our home - for the kids and the grown ups too, for the holidays and all year? Show up. Make space for folks of all ages to just be. Ask your questions. Welcome the joyful noise of children and the laughter of all ages. Be on the watch for those on the outside looking in and find ways to welcome them in. This Advent our worship texts will remind us that we are part of a big multicultural, multi-generational, multi-place-on-the-journey/stage-of-life family not bound by time or space. Let's do what we can to make it so, to be "home-makers."

May Christ be born anew in each of us and create a home for all of us this holiday season.



Worship

By the time you receive this newsletter, Advent will have already begun. The narrative lectionary keeps us in the Jewish scriptures until the 18th of December when we begin to hear about the life of Jesus according to Matthew's gospel. Having changed the voices we usually hear from, we are changing the words we use as we listen to them as well. This year we will:

> WAIT WATCH WONDER and WELCOME

Pick up an Advent devotional calendar at church (*see page 6*) or follow along with the same prompts on our Facebook page. Kids will get the prompts on paper strips to make ever-growing chains (and if any adults want those too, just let us know), and they're going to be the ones lighting our Advent wreath this year too. We'll be asked questions that help us wait, watch, wonder, and welcome and our answers will literally help prepare a place for Jesus' birth.

Plan for some quiet time with us every Wednesday night during Advent at 6:00 p.m. for **Taizé** worship as well as a service that recognizes there is sadness in this season as well as joy on December 21st. We'll gather on **Christmas Eve** at 5:30 p.m. to hear the age-old story that sends us into...

Christmas! We will share a potluck meal together on Sunday, the 25th, at 11:00 a.m. in the Fellowship Hall. Bring your favorite dish and an appetite. We will sing, pray, remember, and celebrate. To ring in the New Year we will have a hymn sing and continue our celebration of this 12-day season. Then, a few days late, we'll come together for...

Epiphany! You can get your star word (or let us know you'd like us to pick one out for you) and continue on the journey with Jesus.





The Chrismon Tree

A Chrismon is a monogram of Christ. All the designs of Chrismon ornaments are symbols for Christ which have been passed down through the centuries of Christian history. All Chrismons are made in combinations of white and gold. White, the liturgical color for Christmas, refers to our Lord's purity and perfection; gold represents the Lord's majesty and glory. At the top of the tree is the Moravian Star, first made in the Moravian settlement at Niesky, Germany, about 1850, a reminder of the star that led the Wise Men to Bethlehem. It also symbolizes the Christ Child of whom the Old Testament prophesied, "A star shall come out of Jacob" (Numbers 24:17). The Risen Christ likewise proclaimed himself as "the root and offspring of David, and the bright and morning star" (Revelation 23:16).

1st Sunday of Advent: WAIT

Sun of Righteousness: An Old Testament prophetic symbol based on Malachi 4:2, "But for you who fear my name the sun of righteousness shall rise, with healing in its wings." In order to identify the sun as a Christ symbol, a Christ monogram has been placed in the center.

Six Pointed Star: Based on an Old Testament prophecy from Numbers 24:17, "A star shall come out of Jacob...," this star appears in many forms. One form is made by combining the Greek letter lota (I) which is the first letter of Jesus, and Chi (X), the letter for Christ. The other is the Jewish Star, also known as the Creator's Star, created by two triangles. It represents that Jesus was born into Judaism, the six days of Creation, and the Trinity.

Serpent on Tau Cross: Prefiguration of the sacrifice on the cross (John 3:14).

Anchor Cross (Cross of Hope): This Child, the hope of the world (Hebrews 6:19).

2nd Sunday of Advent: WATCH

Chi Rho: The most widely known Chrismon in the combination of the first two letters in the Greek form of Christ, Chi (X) and Rho (P). Another name for it is Pax, which is Latin for peace. Sometimes it is shown with the Alpha and the Omega, the first and last letters of the Greek alphabet. Jesus said "I am the Alpha and the Omega" (Revelation 22:12).

3rd Sunday of Advent: WONDER



Latin Cross: Long upright; most widely used form of the cross among Christians.



Celtic Cross: Came from the Isle of Iano; plain cross with circle of everlasting life.

Cross Potent: Also known as the Jerusalem Cross or Crusader's Cross; usually has four small crosses between the arms, the five crosses symbolizing the five wounds of our Lord.

<u>4th Sunday of Advent: WELCOME</u>



Lamb: A scriptural symbol for Christ, Lamb of God (John 1:29 and Revelation 21:22). The standing lamb bearing the cross banner of victory signifies the resurrection.

Rose: Messianic promise, the Messiah. Also, our Lord's virgin mother Mary; His human birth or humanity.

Butterfly: Our Lord's Resurrection; Resurrection of those who die in Christ (1 Corinthians 15:20-23).

Cross Triumphant: (Of Victory); Triumph of the Lord over earthly sin. Christ glorified.




