

Memo: An important message from one of your pastors

Sunday - January 22, 2023

Dearest University Presbyterian folk,

This afternoon I let the session know that I will be retiring from full time ministry this spring. My last day of service with you will be Sunday, April 23. This is a bit earlier than you might have imagined but to my mind and heart the circumstances in my life and in UPC's are right.

These 21 years as your pastor have been perhaps the richest of my life. Together we have welcomed so many into the embrace of the church. We have said goodbye to much of a generation and wished those in Baton Rouge for simply a season of life God's speed in their next chapter. We have baptized, raised, and married our children as well as welcomed them into church leadership or sent them with love to follow other paths. We've held one another's hands as we went through illnesses of mind and body and shared the joy of life's happiest moments.

In all the ways that we have followed Christ together we have shared a commitment to hospitality. Refugees from storms, those working on recovery efforts, folks in the LGBTQ+ community, and others have found sanctuary, welcome, and community here. The major capital campaign that we completed together made the building reflect this vision with handicapped accessible bathrooms, showers, a welcome center, columbarium, dormitory, and revamped playground.

We have navigated changing political situations, a shift in in the role of the deacons at UPC, and were one of the first congregations to join in the work of what is now Together Baton Rouge. These years have been marked by the arrival and departure of Associate pastors, and now the addition of my delightful colleague, Mamie, as Co-Pastor. We've supported one another through a world-wide pandemic and the accompanying technological and interpersonal adjustments. Throughout it all we have faithfully worshipped together and turned our hearts and lives to Christ's call for justice and peace. I am filled with profound gratitude for all the ways you have invited me into your lives and for the ways you have supported me in mine. Being your pastor has been a deep privilege. One that I will always cherish, as I will always cherish you.

My epiphany star word this year is "clarity." It has become clear to me after much prayer and reflection that it is time for the next chapter to begin – the next chapter of my story and the next chapter for you. Upon my retirement Jim and I will be spending a good bit of time in Washington state welcoming our first grandchild and then, well, we will see what God has in store. I have been feeling more and more the call to spend significant time offering Spiritual Direction and will be pursuing that avenue of ministry. But most of all, I will be listening for Christ's call. It is an exciting and sometimes daunting time.

My prayer is that you too will find yourselves at an exciting threshold. I am confident that your future, as your past, will be filled with God's astounding grace and sustenance. I have no doubt that this community will continue - and find new ways as well – to embody God's love and justice.

In the next few months there will be opportunities for imagining what your new chapter might look like. I know that your session, Mamie, and the Presbytery of South Louisiana will offer wonderful leadership in this. In addition to looking forward, there will also be time for sharing memories and stories of our time in ministry together. If you would like time to meet with me individually during the next months, please just send me an email and we will sit down together. The rocking chairs on the sanctuary porch are waiting for us!

Our Story

This Lent we will be hanging out with a variety of the parables in Matthew. Jesus taught using these parables, these stories, as a way to engage his listeners and form their faith. Our own lives (personally, professionally, congregationally) are constituted with stories that both set us apart and knit us together. This Lent we'll have the chance to share some of those as well.

As part of our faith formation, we will have a variety of small groups related to stories. One that will talk about the stories we have about money, another about the stories of each of our lives, one focused on the trauma caused by our country's story of racism, and another will evoke stories by way of fairytales. Visio Divina will look at art that goes along with the parables we'll read on Sundays. (See article on page 6.) Watch the bulletin and your email for specifics about these small groups that will begin after Ash Wednesday (February 22).

Each Friday a story prompt will come to your email, and you are invited to set aside fifteen minutes (or more) to think and write a story in response. We would love to read any of those stories and hope we might form them into a devotional to read during the Easter season. (If you would like some ideas about Lenten devotional readings, Patti or Mamie can offer suggestions.) Find your way or ways to be part of the story this Lent!

Text Prayers

It can be hard to set aside a time to pray. What if you had a group of three or four people who would meet you on your phone once a week for just twenty minutes to share a joy and concern with you and who would listen to yours and hold it too? If that sounds compelling to you, join us for text prayers during Lent. It's a simple way to hear from others and to share your joys and concerns so we all remember we're in this together. PRACTICE FOR LENT - STORYTELLING

To begin, here's a prayer created by Fr. Richard Rohr based on Psalm 46:10. Let it help you be attentive to the presence of God. Find a comforting safe place. Quietly read aloud each line of the prayer, taking slow, steady breaths as you go:

Be still and know that I am God.

Be still and know that I am.

Be still and know.

Be still.

Re.

Amen

THE EXAMEN

Within this new quiet space of awareness of God, begin a weekly examen. Allow this practice to help you see the ways your story is part of God's story.

- 1. Begin by looking back through the week, starting with Sunday and moving from one day to the next. Are there instances that immediately come to mind? Rest on those moments. Let any feelings rise and fall.
- 2. Which of those moments brought feelings of despair, disappointment, sadness, or hopelessness? Hold those feelings for a moment:
 - What lifted you and helped you continue despite those low moments?
 - $What\ did\ you\ wish\ or\ hope\ for\ in\ the\ midst\ of\ those\ moments-perhaps\ an\ apology,\ a\ listening\ ear,\ a\ shoulder\ to\ cry\ on,\ rest?$
 - What small glimmer of light was provided perhaps a laugh, a text, a hug, a cup of coffee or tea, or maybe a nap?
- 3. Go back to the beginning of the week. What moments come to mind that give you feelings of joy, peace, courage, or calm? Let those feelings rise and keep rising:
 - What made you extremely grateful?
 - What made you feel secure?
 - What made you feel seen, loved and known?
 - Where in creation did you see the reflection of God? Where did you see God's reflection in other people?
- 5. What hopes do you hold for next week?

Mission & Peacemaking

Like to Connect with Cuba?

Travel to Cuba these days is a challenge, but there are still ways to connect with and follow our Cuban partner church. If you use Facebook, you can visit and follow the page of partner church Getsemaní in San José de los Ramos (https://www. facebook.com/iglesiapresbiteriana.getsemani.1) or "friend" pastor Josué Montejo (https://www.facebook.com/josue. montejo.921). You can post and send messages in English, but if you wish you can use Google Translate (https://translate. google.com/?hl=en&tab=wT) to read posts or translate your messages, using cut and paste. If you like, George Strain can provide assistance, as well as Facebook connections to other Cuban pastors and individuals who have worked with UPC, including Joel Dopico, Leticia Ramos, Armando Guedes, and Susana Arévalo. They can also be contacted with the smart phone app, WhatsApp, which requires their phone number but costs them less. They welcome prayers sent electronically as well as any other messages. Personal contacts are often the most meaningful part of our partnership.

Getting financial support to Cuba at present can only be done by physical transport during visits (no US banks can do business in Cuba and mail is hopelessly unreliable), but one option is by adding minutes and internet data to their smart phone with the app Ding Top-up to support their pastoral work. Funds can be added to their phones and charged to your credit card. This was especially helpful in keeping the church together during Covid, when face-to-face ministry was impossible.
