There are rhythms to the church year that come from both the church calendar and the "regular" one. Here that means Advent as well as the home football schedule, the start of the school year and All Saints Day, youth group plans and aaalll the parades. The fall also brings us into budget planning for next year. We could call that stewardship season, but the truth is that stewardship is something that happens all year long.

Rather than being just a churchy word for fundraising, stewardship is a spiritual discipline and a way of living that helps us manage what God has entrusted to us and to share with others the joy of giving as a response to God's generosity. We are called to be good stewards of all that we have: stewards of time, stewards of gifts, stewards of resources, stewards of relationships, stewards of ministry, stewards of the knowledge of God, stewards of the people in our community of faith, stewards of the mysteries of God.

What does being a good steward look like in your life? Where would you like to exercise your stewardship muscles a little more?

Those are reflection questions for and throughout our whole lives.

Stewardship does include thinking about the way we spend our money - as a household and as a church. Giving of our financial resources is a spiritual discipline, rooted in gratitude, and there is no "right" amount - nothing that is too small or too large to consider a pledge. It's healthy to talk about money, and the more we do it the easier it gets.

To be the body of Christ in the world we also need more than money. We need folks to: water the plants, prepare the communion elements, show up at the Capitol, be youth advisors, read at Park Elementary, lead small groups, do stream clean up, serve as liturgists, volunteer at the food bank, serve on committees, sing in the choir, wash the dishes, and more! When you share your time and talents, we all win.

Throughout the year we hope you'll reflect on your commitments, and once each year we'll focus together on the commitments we'll all make -

to pledge our financial resources to the ministries that God is calling the church to do, but also to consider our participation and involvement in them. It means having the chance to say "thank you" to God by caring for others with our time, talent, and treasure. It means it's not just something to pay attention to in October, even if we may use the word a little more then!



### **Easing The Transition from Home to School**

Returning to school is a huge time of transition for parents and children individually and families as a family unit. Tradition, ritual, and spiritual practice can help get you back on track. Here are three very simple faith practices you might try as you get your year off to a great start. All of these are from the book Faithful Families, Creating Sacred Moments at Home by Traci Smith.

- 1. End the night with a butterfly hug. Cross your hands and interlock your thumbs, like a butterfly. Put the tips of your fingers on your collarbone and tap them back and forth, one at a time. Tap, tap, tap.
- 2. Step into the new year with footprints. Make footprints in the sand or with paint to think about how you'll walk with the spirit this year. Save the prints from year to year and watch how you grow!
- 3. End the night with a nightly examen. The examen is simply looking over and reviewing the day that has passed. Some people do this by asking about "highs and lows" and others talk about a "rose and thorn" or "joy and concern." I like asking the question: "When did you feel close to God today" and "When did you feel far away?'

Parents, on Sundays let's meet up in the Welcome Center for coffee and doughnuts to talk about how things are going. Blessings to you and your family as you begin a new school year!

### Love Your Neighbor: A Public Service Announcement (PSA)

September holds various high holidays for our Jewish siblings. Here's a quick rundown so you can be aware and be respectful.

Rosh Hashanah begins at sundown on Friday, September 15 and lasts through sundown Sunday, September 17. Yom Kippur begins at sundown on Sunday, September 24 and lasts until Monday night, September 25.

Lesser known holidays Sukkot, Shmini Atzeret, and Simchat Torah are also part of this holiday season. Sukkot begins at sundown on Friday, September 29 and the non-work holiday lasts until sundown on Sunday, October 1. Sukkot continues (as a working holiday) until sundown on Friday, October 6. Shmini Atzeret begins that same night, Friday, October 6, and the following night begins Simchat Torah, which lasts until sundown on Sunday, October 8, both as non-work holidays.

During these days, please be thoughtful of those who observe them by not scheduling meetings, conference calls, or deadlines. For teachers, please do not schedule tests, presentations, or other mandatory activities. And remember that many of us host family and/or other guests for these holidays.

For those who celebrate Christmas, imagine if everyone wanted something from you between the mornings of December 24th and December 26th while you had multiple things cooking, preparations to be in services, and family and friends coming over.

Be thoughtful, kind, and inclusive.

And greetings: "Happy New Year" is appropriate to say on Rosh Hashanah, the Jewish New Year. "Have an easy/meaningful fast" is appropriate to say on Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement when Jews traditionally fast for 25 hours. Or to avoid mentioning fasting (which not everyone can do) you can say "Have a meaningful holiday" instead. "Happy holiday" is appropriate for Sukkot, Shmini Atzeret, and Simchat Torah, and really most Jewish holidays.






### Presbyterian Women of Presbytery of South Louisiana Fall Gathering

The Presbyterian Women (PW) of the Presbytery of South Louisiana (PSL) held their Fall Gathering on August 19th at First Presbyterian Church of Scotlandville. Seven Presbyterian Women from UPC attended. We are all thankful that we can now gather in person. The event was well attended by fourty-four women from eight churches in the presbytery. Patrice Butler, pastor of First Presbyterian Church of Scotlandville, led us in a workshop on the 2023-2024 PW Bible Study, Sacred Encounters. The nine lessons in the study cover sacred encounters in Luke-Acts. They include the story of Mary and Elizabeth meeting when they were pregnant with Jesus and John. Also included is the story of the hemorrhagic woman who was healed by touching Jesus' robes and other stories.

A workshop on PW Interpretation and Information was held. Also, a hands on workshop was held to fill hygiene bags with items such as toothpaste, toothbrush, soap, socks, shampoo, combs, snacks, etc. Sixty-four bags were filled to be given to a nursing home that the Scotlandville church supports. ### WE'RE GOING TO CUBA!

A UPC group will be traveling to visit our Cuba partner church (Getsemaní) September 22-27, and we hope to bring with us essentials that Cubans are unable to secure. Below is a list of items they have requested. A labeled box is in the Welcome Center to collect donations. For any questions, contact George Strain (937-8094, <u>strain@lsu.edu</u>).

**Medications:** aspirin, acetaminophen/Tylenol, ibuprofen/Advil, Excedrin, vitamin C, multivitamins, multivitamins for 50+, folic acid, omeprazole, Pepto Bismol, diarrhea pills, Alka Seltzer, calcium, vitamin D3, antacids, Benadryl, loratadine/Clarityn, cytericin/Zyrtec, hydration salts, thermometers, suture kits, syringes, urinary catheters and collection bags (Cuba has universal health care but no meds or medical supplies)

**Food and personal items:** toothpaste, toothbrushes, soap, stockings for children and adults; cumin, oregano, cloves, complete seasoning, powdered milk (especially hard to find in Cuba)

**Sunday school materials:** colors, crayons, modeling clay, board games (need not be new), parcheesi, dominos, cards, balloons, foam craft sheets, etc.

### **INTERNATIONAL PEACEMAKERS**

The Presbyterian Peace Program of the PC(USA) Mission Agency has a program known as International Peacemakers that brings faith leaders from other countries to the US to lift up issues of peace and justice that are facing their countries. One of the ten Peacemakers for 2023 is Alison Infante, moderator of the Synod of Cuba and pastor at the Juan G Hall Church in Cardenas, Cuba. The Presbytery of South Louisiana will host Alison from September 15-21. He will preach in worship on September 17th, and we will share a meal with him in the Fellowship Hall that evening. Alison is a friend of a number of UPC members who have visited Cuba, and we're excited about the opportunity to have him here to talk about the challenges facing the Cuban church and the difficulties of day-to-day life for all Cubans. ### The Peace & Global Witness Offering

The Peace & Global Witness Offering is one of four annual special offerings of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). They play an important role in defining what it means to be a connectional church in the twenty-first century, bringing together the diversity of the PC (USA) to focus and take faith-based action on shared concerns. The offerings offer opportunities for partnership, learning, and witness and profoundly affect the life of the church as a collective witness to Jesus Christ's love for the whole church.

Individual congregations are encouraged to use up to 25% of the Peace and Global Witness Offering to engage in local peacemaking and reconciliation ministries. Mid-councils retain 25% for ministries of peace and reconciliation. The remaining 50% is used by the Presbyterian Mission Agency to advocate for peace and justice in cultures of violence, including our own, through collaborative projects of education and Christian witness.

Our goal for this year's offering is \$1000, which would exceed the \$741 collected in 2022. As always, we encourage your suggestions as we prayerfully discern which local ministry we will support this year. The Peace and Global Witness Offering will be collected on **October 1**; however, online giving is available at any time through (1) the GIVE tab on our website at <u>www.upcbr.org</u> (2) the Realm mobile app, (3) your REALM profile in the Realm website at <u>www.onrealm.org</u>, or (4) by texting "UPCBR [number of dollars]" to 73256.
