In the 1970s, Ray Oldenburg, a sociologist, suggested that informal, public gathering spaces were critical for the functioning of civil society. He called those spaces "third places" - the "first place" being a person's home and the people they live with, and the "second place" being the workplace.

Third places are anchors of community life, and they have a variety of attributes:

- there is no obligation to be there;
- your status doesn't matter there;
- there are usually "regulars," but welcoming ones who draw others in;
- they are accessible and accommodating;
- conversation is often central, and the mood is often playful;
- they are not pretentious or snobby, and they can be cozy

Basically, they are places you relax in public - where you encounter familiar faces and make new acquaintances.

Oldenburg was thinking more of public libraries, bars, cafes, and parks, but I think churches - at our best - are this as well. We offer a place to go that is not home or work but where you can still be yourself. You can see friends and meet new people. We want the building and programs to be available and open to anyone. Maybe UPC could be more playful, but I've also seen y'all cut up, so...

What I know, and what I give deep thanks for, is that church is a place I can count on. It is a place that has to take me, and generally does so with great joy. Church is a place that invites me to be better as it tries to be better, but it reminds me that, no matter what, I am loved by God and by people that aren't my family. It is a place that reminds me that I am part of a larger story - the story of God - whose narrative arc started way before me and is longer than I can see or describe alone. It is a story in which I belong, and have an important place, though no more important than any of the other cloud of witnesses to whom I also belong. For me it's more like a $2\frac{1}{2}$ space (occupational hazard), but I remain grateful for it - for you. Thank you.

Stewardship

WHAT IS YOUR VISION FOR UPC?

This year UPC committees were tasked to provide a "Vision Budget" to share how they would use a significant increase in their annual budgets. As you decide on your pledge for 2024, please think about these visions. If we all increase what we pledge, UPC will be able to meet these needs for now and the future.

WORSHIP: \$30,000 for livestreaming and organ maintenance

•\$20,000 for upgrades/replacements of audio and video hardware to improve livestreaming. Each Sunday, 20-30 people worship online; more sign-in later.

•\$10,000 to add to the organ repair fund, with the expectation that the organ is going to need major repairs in the next ten years. A total of \$120.000 will ultimately be needed.

PROPERTY: \$5,000 to Maintenance Reserve

•We are concerned about the AC unit that handles the Kitchen/Fellowship Hall/Offices. Adding to the Maintenance Reserve means we will not be completely caught off guard.

PRESBYTERIAN WOMEN: \$500 for childcare for PW Retreat

• Presbyterian Women will host a one-day retreat in Baton Rouge, bringing women of all ages together for fellowship, creative time, and spiritual writing. Childcare will be provided for those participating using these funds.

PERSONNEL: \$15,000 for staff

• Raise pastor and staff salaries by 5%.

• Hire a part-time (5 hours/week) Communication Coordinator position to be responsible for digital strategies to improve UPC's communication with the congregation and community, through Instagram and other social media platforms.

NURTURE: \$500

• to revive the monthly Caregiver Support meetings including lunch.

MISSION & PEACEMAKING: 5% Increase, about \$2,100

• In order to build upon UPC's Matthew 25 commitments to eradicate systemic poverty and dismantle structural racism, we could expand our response to climate-driven disasters by increasing contributions to disaster support organizations, and our partnership with groups working at the intersection of addressing poverty and racism.

FELLOWSHIP: \$600 for events

• These funds would subsidize the cost of the crawfish boil and fish fry to lessen the cost for families and individuals, and to provide roast turkey for an Advent meal.

DAY SCHOOL:

• Minimum of 3% increase in base pay for teachers; provide optional benefits for teachers; new software for processing tuition payments; additional security options for Day School

What is Per Capita?

Each year UPC sends money to support our Presbytery, Synod, and the national church. We send \$80 per church member (per capita) in gratitude for the ways those bodies support us locally. This year we have had a safety seminar sponsored by the Presbytery, our synod contact for Disaster Recovery preached for us, and we will have a representative from the Presbyterian Foundation speak to our Transitions small group and preach for us - among many less noticeable means of connection. If you are able to do so, would you consider adding \$80 to your giving this year to cover your per capita expense and help us be stronger together?

How to Give in Realm

Log into your Realm account at onrealm.org. If you don't yet have a realm account, please contact the church office. Once you are in your profile go to GIVING then +PLEDGE and a new pledge window will appear. Choose the GENERAL FUND for 2024, fill in how often you would like to pledge, from dates 1/1/2024 to 12/31/2024, and how much you would like to pledge. Realm will calculate the yearly total for you. When you are done click SAVE PLEDGE. It's that easy!

REMINDER:

If you change your pledge and have automatic payments sent through REALM, remember to update your bank information. REALM will not automatically do that for you.

- Synod of Mid-America Grounded Gardening hosts a worshipful support group for people with mental health variances.
- Synod of Mid-Atlantic Summer Arts Camp offers a safe, tuition-free summer camp that introduces children from families that struggle financially to valuable art experiences for healing.
- Synod of South Atlantic Immokalee Fair Housing Alliance provides safe and affordable housing for agricultural workers and their families.
- Synod of South Atlantic Gainesville Community Counseling Center provides mental health support, community education and camping that addresses the challenges facing LGBTQIA+ youth.
- Synod of the Northeast TAUM provides a safe space in an underserved area for youth to learn to use Microsoft Office to develop skills that prepare them for employment.
- Synod of the Sun Okra Abbey: Their sanctuary is a garden where food grows and where people and faith grows thru sharing stories, scripture and prayers. A solar power system will allow them to expand. Zambia: A new health care facility that will provide maternal, prenatal and postnatal care as well as primary care of children.

Forgiving Medical Debt

UPC has been talking a lot about forgiving medical debt – you may have heard about this in worship or in church school. So what is this all about?

We know what Jesus calls us to do in Matthew 25- when we encounter someone hungry and give them food, thirsty and give them drink, when we welcome the stranger and visit the prisoner, that is where we encounter God. UPC recently joined the PC USA's Matthew 25 movement, which calls us to look for the ways we can follow Jesus's call in our society today. One of the calls of the Matthew 25 movement is to eradicate systemic poverty, by taking a hard look at the systems and structures that bind our neighbors in poverty. One example of these systems is the prevalence of medical debt.

We know that we live in a world where not all have equal access to healthcare, nor to the things that keep us healthy. More often than not unfair systems contribute to sickness, and then when lack of access to affordable healthcare puts people in debt, they become more and more trapped. Medical debt is a debt of necessity not of choice, and it does not affect people equally. It disproportionately affects Black households and further compounds the racial wealth gap, making this an urgent issue of racial justice. Medical debt is pervasive and the emotional weight and toxicity of unpaid medical bills affects people's mental health and economic well-being. Studies show that people forgo or delay care due to fear of medical bills. Twentythree million people in the US (nearly 1 in 10 adults) owe significant medical debt with an estimate of \$195 billion owed.

Here is the good news: we have been learning that there is a way we can relieve this burden for our neighbors. An organization called RIP Medical Debt was founded in 2014 by two former collections industry executives. This program's mission is to end medical debt by combining the generosity of donors with debtindustry expertise to produce a high volume of debt relief. They use data and knowledge of the debt buying market to find people who need debt relief the most, then buy up the medical debt for pennies on the dollar. Then, they forgive the debt. Beneficiaries receive a letter in the mail to tell them that their debt has been forgiven. In less than 10 years RIP Medical Debt has erased over \$8 billion in medical debt by buying it down for pennies on the dollar. They estimate that a \$100 donation relieves \$10,000 in medical debt. This debt relief reduces mental and financial distress for millions of people. This program receives a 100% rating on Charity Navigator.

We kicked off our efforts to relieve medical debt with a special offering taken up on August 27th – on that day, your contributions totaled over \$3,000! RIP Medical Debt estimates that our collection can be put to use to relieve over \$300,000 in medical debt. Just imagine for a moment the relief this will bring – thank you UPC!

The adult and the youth church schools are continuing their campaign to raise funds to relieve medical

debt throughout the church school year, and will complete a final total contribution in May. There's a friendly (read:cutthroat) competition between the adult and the youth church school classes to see who can raise the most this year – game on!

Cuba Ministries Update

September was a busy month! Our ministry partnership of 33 years with our Cuban brothers and sisters works by walking side by side, sharing in the ministries of our faith. This is a change from the more colonial, paternalistic model of the past.

In mid-September, UPC and the Presbytery of South Louisiana sponsored the visit of Pastor Alison Infante Zamora through the PC(USA) International Peace makers Program. Alison is moderator of the Presbyterian Synod of Cuba and pastor at Juan G. Hall church in Cardenas, Cuba. In his sermon at the September 17th worship and at fellowship dinner the same day he shared issues of peace and justice that are facing the church in Cuba. While here he had the opportunity to visit the One Stop Homeless Center, the Louisiana Organization for Refugees and Immigrants (LORI), and he met with officials with the Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry. This was followed by travel to New Orleans to spend time with other Presbyterian churches and visit affiliated community organizations.

Following that visit, a UPC team left to visit Cuba with two goals. First was a sustainability visit to our partner Gethsemane Presbyterian Church in San José de los Ramos, to restore and strengthen our partnership after several years of COVID-forced absence. We renewed many old friendships. The second was to check on the operation of Living Waters for the World systems installed in San José, Sabanilla, Matanzas Central, the Cuban Council of Churches in Havana, and the Convent of Santa Brigida in Old Havana. In addition to all of the donated supplies from UPC (thank you for your generosity), we delivered funds and various items (cataract lenses, iPhone cases, prescription medicines, letters) to people and groups from various other US-based churches.
