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A View from the Bench

I never set out to be a church musician. But God had a plan to keep me from straying too far.

It seemed an accident of circumstances. As a choral music education student at DePauw University, I was supposed to minor in voice, but too many voice teachers were out on sabbatical, or for other reasons, and it was suggested I study organ until I could move to voice.

Well. I liked it. Enough to spend more time practicing organ instead of my major instrument, piano. I switched majors. There wasn't any particular emphasis on church music, so it didn't cross my mind that I might spend a lot of time playing in churches.

But I did. I never had to look for a church job. They found me. Sometimes I was the organist, sometimes the choir director, and sometimes both. I served churches in Ohio, Missouri, and Louisiana.

I don't remember exactly how you found me. Probably through some grapevine of substitute organists, which is what I was doing at the time. I played for a wedding. I played for a few Sundays here (2008), and then a few more there (2009), and then a little longer (2010, 2011), until finally I became "official" in 2012. Eventually, I retired from my school library position and this became my retirement job.

Aside from the fact that I was here longer than any other church, University Presbyterian will always stand out. The preaching was revelatory, the people friendly and kind (if somewhat chatty during the prelude), and wow, you all sing like no other congregation I've played for. That made playing here especially fun, along with the fine volunteer choir and wonderful musical colleagues in Lois and now our student conductors. There were times this job kept me sane (and maybe one or two where it drove me just a little nuts).

I pray that a new organist will come along and find the job as fulfilling as I have. She or he will be very lucky.



Faith Formation

The Results Are In!

Faith Formation thanks the 85 UPC members who responded to the FF Adult Church School Preferences survey. We know you've all been waiting with bated breath for the results:

Class time: A bit of a split here: 57% prefer the new church school time (9:30); 37% prefer the old time (9:45). Almost 20% would attend a class at 11:15, if the church service moved to 10:00 am all year round.

Class content: Clear demand exists for the Bible study class (just to be clear--FF has NEVER considered canceling the Bible study class!). It is also clear that many UPCers want the return of what we used to call the "Parks Wilson class" (classes that examine specific issues or themes, running for 2-6 weeks, often led by an "expert" but with time for discussion):

- •60% want a variety of class leaders.
- •56% want the leader to be an expert on the topic.
- •53% want topics discussed over a series of sessions.
- •77% want time for discussion.
- •We are split on the desirability of a class that requires some pre-class preparation from attenders: 35% want to study a book, 38% would attend a class with reading required; 38% want no reading or other mid-week prep.
- There is a small group who would very much like to continue with the new-this-year class, currently meeting in the Parks Wilson Room, that discusses the last week's Scripture texts and sermon.

Class composition: 92% want classes made up of a diverse group of adults only, but 31% are open to classes attended by both youth and adults, and 17% would attend a class designed for their age group.

Thank you for all the suggestions RE adult class topics and for those of you who are willing to join FF in some capacity!

A Final Note: Because 86% of the respondents are over age 55, FF is pondering creative ways to reach the 55-and-under crowd. If you have suggestions contact Meredith Veldman.

2023 Annual Reports

Mission and Peacemaking

As the Mission and Peacemaking committee at UPC, we are tasked with planning and overseeing UPC's involvement in mission and peacemaking activities on a local, regional, national and international level. We seek to provide resource to help UPC members grow as peacemakers, and work for social, racial, religious, environmental and economic justice.

In 2023 UPC joined the PC USA's Matthew 25 movement, which calls us to look for the ways we can follow Jesus's call to feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, welcome the stranger, and visit the prisoner. UPC has committed to two of the focus areas of the PC USA's Matthew 25 movement to help us be the church in the world today: a call to eradicate systemic poverty, and to dismantle systemic racism.

To discern new and creative ways to live into these commitments, we took a hard look at the systems and structures that bind our neighbors in poverty - like the prevalence of medical debt. We know that unfair systems contribute to sickness, and then when lack of access to affordable healthcare puts people in debt, they become more and more trapped. Medical debt is a debt of necessity not of choice, and it disproportionately affects Black households and further compounds the racial wealth gap, making this an urgent issue of racial justice as well. The good news is, that through partnering with RIP Medical Debt, we can relieve this burden for our neighbors. We kicked off our efforts to relieve medical debt with a special offering, and UPC's donations were put to use to relieve over \$300,000 in medical debt for our neighbors in Louisiana. The adult and the youth church schools are continuing their campaign to raise funds to relieve medical debt - hence the youth group's Bowl-a-thon fundraiser on Palm Sunday! - and will complete a final total contribution at the end of May.

In 2023 we also continued long-standing partnerships and started some new ones, for good work in our community and beyond, much of which can also be understood as flowing from our Matthew 25 commitments:

- •We continue our commitment to community organizing through our membership in and engagement with Together Baton Rouge, where we build relationships and organize across lines of race, religion, neighborhood and politics, to build power, address community problems, and achieve change as part of our common call to justice.
- •We partner with LORI: Louisiana Organization for Refugee and Immigrants, an organization that advocates for refugees and immigrants in our community. LORI provides legal assistance, and promotes civic engagement and social and economic development, with the goal of creating self-reliance.
- UPC had a long-time partnership, and fellowship, with St. Anthony's Home, which provided housing and support to individuals disabled due to HIV and AIDS. When St. Anthony's home closed last year, we determined to continue our commitment to our siblings experiencing HIV and AIDS, who we know are disproportionately coping

with the effects of systemic poverty and structural racism as well. We have begun a new partnership with Family Service of Greater Baton Rouge, which provides a variety of resources and support to individuals with HIV, including coordinating care, programs for women and children, and HIV counseling and testing.

- •In addition to our partnership with Capital Area Alliance for the Homeless to care for our unhoused neighbors, and with IRIS Domestic Violence Shelter to remove the barriers of poverty that serve to bind people in violent situations, we partner with Habitat for Humanity to build permanent homes for families. UPC and the UPC "She Nailed It" team provided labor and financial support to the Women Build, building a Habitat for Humanity home for a local homeowner last fall.
- •We continue our commitment to feeding the hungry, partnering with the Greater Baton Rouge Food Bank and the LSU Food Pantry, to address hunger widely in the parish and close by at LSU.
- •We address the disproportionate impact of disasters which are increasingly climate-driven disasters on impoverished communities and people of color, by partnering with Presbyterian Disaster Assistance for assistance to impacted communities close to home and all over the world. In response to the dire humanitarian crisis in Gaza, we provided funding to World Central Kitchen, the organization led by Jose Andres, which is working with to provide meals to Gazans who have been impacted and displaced by the war.
- •To offer hospitality and welcome to our LGBTQ+ siblings who have often been excluded, we partner with two Presbyterian organizations focusing on welcome to LGBTQ+ persons, Covenant Network and More Light Presbyterians. UPC showed up and showed our welcome during the Baton Rouge Pride festival this year, engaging in fellowship (including passing out plenty of rainbow "You Are Loved" stickers and applying plenty of rainbow "Beloved" temporary tattoos) with festival-goers throughout the day.

Farther afield, we were joyful for the opportunity to invest time and resources last year into UPC's 30+ year relationship with our partner church in Cuba, Iglesia Presbiteriana Getsemaní in San José de los Ramos. In 2023, our delegation including members of UPC and First Presbyterian Lafayette visited our partner church as well as 4 other locations in Cuba, to assess and support continued maintenance and operation of clean water systems that UPC teams have helped to install over the years through Living Waters for the World. In response to what we learned of the dire needs in the church community, we were able to bring material support such as much-needed medicine, funding to help with the church's program to feed vulnerable seniors, and we partnered with the Lafayette and Ft. Worth congregations to collectively fund repairs to the church-owned vehicle, which is now allowing for the pastoral staff to effectively travel between and care for multiple congregations.

2023 Annual Reports

Personnel and Administration

The Personnel and Administration committee had a relatively busy year in 2023. In the spring it recommended the timing and terms of Patti Snyder's retirement to the session, which approved them. It set up a committee that held Patti's retirement party and, for her retirement gift, commissioned Bill Crummett's beautiful stained glass of the church window. In addition, it discussed at some length how best to replace Patti, both in the short and long term, although of course the session then makes decisions on such matters.

The committee recommended, and the session later approved, adding Juneteenth and the Monday after Easter to the existing list of church holidays.

As the committee primarily responsible for the oversight of the church staff, in the fall it recommended a 5 percent raise for the church staff, which the session then approved. The previous fall, we conducted, in consultation with the pastor and various members of the congregation, yearly reviews of the staff; all were found to be doing an excellent job. During the year, however, and with the session's approval, the committee adopted a revised procedure for staff evaluations. New staff members will be evaluated yearly for their first two years; after that, each staff member will be evaluated only every third year, although if any problems arise, they can be addressed through an evaluation at once.

P&A also assisted the committees directly responsible for replacing departing staff members. On behalf of P&A Cordell Haymon served on the search committee that chose Ross Cawthon as choir director. Currently, Janet Whyde serves on the search committee for a new organist and Gaines Foster on the committee to hire a new Day School director.

Finally, as it tries to do every year, the committee reviewed its own list of responsibilities and those of other UPC committees. It dd recommend, and the session approved, removing responsibility for a technology committee from P&A, which had no particular expertise in the area. In addition, P&A reviewed the church operations manual.

Although much of its work remains advisory to the session and coordinated with the pastor as head of staff, the P&A committee provides members of the congregation a means to ensure that those who work for and with us are treated fairly and that the church operates as efficiently as possible. In doing so, the committee meets no more than monthly and only when necessary, almost always on Zoom.

Mission & Peacemaking
