The numbers are in and UPCers have contributed \$13,406.56 to combat medical debt in Louisiana. Because every dollar we give translates to \$100 of debt cleared, we were able to wipe away over ONE MILLION dollars of medical debt (\$1,340,656.00) which relieved a burden for over SIX HUNDRED people (609). "Helpful things to know about the Book of Job"

- Who wrote the Book of Job?
 No one knows.
- When was the Book of Job written?

 The Book of Job was probably written between the 7th and 4th centuries BCE.
- What is the style of writing of the Book of Job?

 The opening chapters (1 & 2) are prose.

 The latter chapters (3 thru 41) are Hebrew poetry.
- What type of literature is the Book of Job?

 The Book of Job is an allegorical story.
- Who is Job?

 Job is a fictionalized character.
- What is the theme of the Book of Job?

 The Book of Job addresses the nature of human suffering and the role of God vis-à-vis suffering humanity.
- Why was the Book of Job written?

The Book of Job was written in part to introduce a developing Hebrew theology that gave decreasing credit and blame to human beings for their evident good fortune or setbacks in their life circumstances. In contrast, God is shown to be the author of both blessed and catastrophic events of human life.

What is the problem presented in the Book of Job? The problem presented in the Book of Job is a theological issue: theodicy, or the problem of the existence of perceived evil in this world created and ordered by a good God.
