Each week we light a candle as the church service begins to remember God and remind ourselves that we can always talk to God (whether we have a candle to light or not). At the end of the service when we blow out the flame we do so proclaiming that God is everywhere, as we watch the smoke curl and rise. Sometimes the kids laugh a little bit because I ask the same question every week, but that's part of the purpose of ritual - to know what's coming and what to do. These days there is often far more uncertainty in our lives than we are comfortable with, so it is helpful to have something familiar, something tethering, something you can count on when things otherwise feel a bit chaotic.

In many ways our whole worship service is meant to provide that comfort, though there is often challenge woven into the fabric of it as well. Knowing that you will have a chance to confess and be forgiven, that there will be prayer and singing, and read scriptures which have bound God-seekers for centuries - all of that is meant to help bring you back to a centering place that will restore you before sending you out again to love the world with all you've got. Our worship service is itself a ritual, one that tethers us to one another, to God, and to the love, grace, and hope we need to sustain us.

But that doesn't have to happen only in church.

In the run up to Election Day, I have found myself getting anxious more often, with worry holding an unhealthy sway over me. For the last month, to pull myself back to a more centered place, my family and I have been praying at dinner time, specifically about the upcoming elections. Each night we light a candle (to remind us of God) and we use a resource from the United Church of Christ that offers us short but expansive prayers that range in topic from the election process to electoral candidates, from our neighbors to ourselves, from our words to our actions. In moments when anxiety about the future has taken hold, these prayers and this whole ritual have helped me stay grounded in the truth of God's ongoing presence - yesterday, today, and all the upcoming tomorrows.

None of us know what will happen on election day, and (given our last election experience) we can't be sure of what will happen after that day either. What we can know is that regardless of the outcome on November 5th, God will continue to be and to work among us, and there will be work to do. With that in mind I invite you to pray this prayer for the first day of November along with me and mine.

Friday, Nov 1 - Comforting Spirit, remind us that through all the ages you are God. Today, tomorrow, and the day after the election. Wrap us in the protection of your love as we press forward into tomorrow. Amen.

As an elective, the Day School is looking into offering a marshal arts class for the students. One of the teachers graduated and received her CDA and another of the teachers has begun her classes.



Traditionally, an Advent wreath is composed of greenery with four purple (or three purple and one pink in honor of Gaudete Sunday) candles, representing the four Sundays leading up to Advent. The centerpiece is traditionally a white candle, symbolizing the birth of Christ.



During the Advent season, candles represent the growing light of Christ's presence, which is soon to arrive and illuminate the darkness of our world. More than just a symbol, Advent is about living a Christ-centered life that brings hope, peace, joy, and love to a world in need.

It isn't quite time for Advent yet (this year it actually does begin on December 1), but we wanted you to have some heads up so you can get an Advent wreath together at home! It doesn't need to be fancy - it can even just be five candles (the four noted here, and one Christ candle for Christmas Eve, and on through Christmas if you wish). They don't even have to be purple (or blue) and pink - just something to allow your focus to settle a little in this busy time of year. If you want to skip the real flames because your kids are small and the idea of flames+kids worries you then construction paper is your friend! There are a lot of easy ideas on Google for homemade wreaths, but all you really need is a green circle and 5 rectangles. You can add a paper "flame" each week. Take some time over Thanksgiving and get ready to get ready for Christmas!

In October, UPC joined Iris Domestic Violence Center's "Ummasking Domestic Violence" gala fundraiser as a sponsor to help our long-time partner organization raise funds for new programming and tools to expand their services. Their goal is to be able to share a warm and welcoming space with any adults, kids, and teens who need to escape from violence and rebuild their lives in safety. Iris Director, Patti Joy Freeman, spoke about how the organization is filling their new, greatly expanded facility space and what they offer to survivors - from their emergency shelter wing, to the new 6-12 month on-site transitional housing wing, new children's program, a full legal department, and services to support re-location. Post-Hurricane Helene Disaster Recovery: Thinking of UPC Satellite Community in NC

Many UPC members know folks in North Carolina who have been affected by Hurricane Helene. According to the FEMA website as of Oct 15: 28 counties are eligible for aid. 600 roads are closed (100 on/near interstate, state and federal highways). And 6,900 sites exist where roads and bridges are damaged.

If you wish to help, monetary gifts are the best choice right now. Many agencies can acquire quantities in bulk more efficiently than we can send from afar.

UPC, through the Mission & Peacemaking committee selected two froups to receive funding to make a greater impact. We are sending the remaining \$2467.63 in Local & Worldwide funds to the hurricane fund of Presbyterian Disaster Assistance and \$2000.00 in Other Food Security funds to World Central Kitchen. While we could earmark our donation for a specific region, both organizations do work in many places – meaning that many across the affected states will receive support and relief.

That said, many of you have expressed concern and a desire to help. In deciding where to donate, and in conversation with UPC members who have family and other specific connections in North Carolina, we have created a short list of trusted partners in the affected regions. This is list is not meant to be limiting, but is short to keep it from being overwhelming.

Because of You...

We are very grateful that 83 households have made financial pledges to the church for 2025. So far we have 9 new pledges, and 32 folks have increased their pledge! Thank you! We know that all who have turned in a commitment have made considered decisions about the ways you are able to support UPC going forward.

We do need anyone who has not yet pledged but plans to do so to turn it in as soon as you are able. We cannot know how to plan for next year without knowing the financial landscape available to us - including whether or not we can responsibly extend a call to an Associate Pastor. If you have given money in the past but are unable to do so this coming year, don't fret, it's ok! It will help if you can let us know that is the case so we can budget responsibly.

Year-End Financial Giving

As we near the end of the year, we want to make sure you know some important details regarding financial gifts to UPC.

Pledges & Gifts - All year end gifts, pledges, special offerings, and designated gifts to UPC should be postmarked by December 31. The office will be closed between Christmas and the new year, so anything <u>delivered in person</u> would need to come in by the 19th to be recognized as charitable gifts for tax purposes in 2024. If you pay your 2025 pledge online in 2024 the church will make sure to fulfill any remaining balance for 2024 before applying the rest to 2025.

Gifts of Stock - Because we believe in being good stewards of what God has entrusted to us, we encourage you to thoughtfully consider the advantages of giving stock to UPC. If you own appreciated stock, it is almost always better to contribute stock than cash. By giving appreciated stock to a charitable organization, you avoid paying capital gains tax on the increased value of the stock. Because you are giving to a charitable organization, your gift is deductible for the market value of the stock at the time it was given. Many of our members have found that giving appreciated stock to the church makes very good sense. Please ask your financial advisor if this is a viable option for you.

If you plan to give securities to the church, the deadline for the Texas Presbyterian Foundation to receive them on our behalf for this fiscal year is Tuesday, December 24th. Please first notify Edward Peterson, our church treasurer, and he can review transfer instructions with you personally. UPC's policy is to immediately sell all stock gifts and deposit the proceeds from the sale into the church bank account.
