I had a whole theory about what I was going to write this month, and then it snowed

I don't know about you all, but I spent a great deal of that Tuesday just looking out the window. Sure, I made some phone calls, worked on some stuff for worship, and finished all this Contact stuff, but I also just watched the snow fall. Then I went out for a little bit, and it was so quiet. Some of that was the snowfall, but it was also the fact that no one was out driving, or doing much of anything really (understandably). Having lived further north for much of my life - even up in the arctic of Chicago - I am no stranger to snow, but there was something different about having snow here.

For one, it is not a given. When we got here in 2021 there was a big freeze, but hardly any snow. My hairdresser was clear that the last time the weather did anything like what we saw last month was in 2017. (She even knew the day, though I don't remember it now.) Then, you take into account the fact that it didn't just snow. It snowed…like a lot, for a long time. It may not have beaten the record (12.5 inches in 1895), but new snow kept coming for hours, and it made snuggling up on the couch that much more delightful. Even knowing it was coming I think we were all still a little flabbergasted, or it seemed that way, as I got text after text with photos of the same snow falling at other people's houses, or at one of the lakes, or at the church. And I loved every single one of them.

The biggest difference for me though, was how everything just stopped. Because we don't really have the infrastructure to clear the snow (why would we?) folks were strongly encouraged not to drive, and from what I could tell, they didn't. Hardly a car passed by our house, and there was no sound of traffic from Florida Blvd. There weren't snow plows working hard to make the roads passable again so we could get back to it (whatever it was). We all just knew that the world was going to stop for a while that day, and, at least in my house, we enjoyed the heck out of it.

Some folks were not able to sit back and enjoy the day as I did. They had to get to the hospital, or dialysis, or hospice, or what have you (to work or to receive care), and part of my time looking out the window was taken up with prayers for those folks and the ones they care for. Still, for me, that day was a gift. It was a day, taken out of time, at a time when I really needed it. It was an inbreaking, an epiphany, of awe and wonder that offered an interruption from the anxiety of the world. It reminded me that sometimes we do just need to stop and offer prayers of "wow," even as we also offer ones of care and concern.

And to everyone who checked in to see how happy my kid was about the snow...too thrilled for words, my friends - too thrilled for words.

Chocolate Bourbon Pecan Pie

Submitted by Junita Meier, 2025 Golden Pie Plate Winner

- 1 cup light corn syrup
- 3 large eggs
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 tbs melted butter
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- 3 tsp vanilla flavored bourbon
- 1 tsp Steen's cane syrup
- 2 1/2 cups pecans
- 1/3 cup mini semi-sweet chocolate chips unbaked pie crust

Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

Mix corn syrup, eggs, sugar, butter, vanilla, bourbon, & cane syrup together using a spoon; stir in pecans & chocolate chips. Pour into pie crust. Cover edges of pie crust with aluminum foil strips.

Bake for 60-70 minutes.

Allow to cool for 2 hours, then refrigerate until ready to serve.

Ellie Krieger's Spinach Lasagna Soup

Submitted by Christine Kooi, 2025 UPC Soup and Pie Golden Ladle Winner

Ingredients:

- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 8 ounces sweet Italian-style chicken sausage, casings removed (see NOTE)
- 1 medium yellow onion (about 8 ounces), diced
- 3 cloves garlic, minced or finely grated
- 2 tablespoons tomato paste
- 1 teaspoon dried oregano
- 1 teaspoon dried basil
- 1/2 teaspoon fine sea or table salt
- 1/4 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- 4 cups low-sodium chicken broth
- One (15-ounce) can no-salt-added crushed tomatoes
- 1 cup water
- 4 ounces lasagna sheets, broken into pieces (about 5 noodles)
- 3 cups (2 ounces) lightly packed fresh spinach leaves, coarsely chopped
- 1/3 cup ricotta cheese (part-skim or whole)
- 1/4 cup (scant 1 ounce) grated Parmesan cheese
- 1/4 cup fresh basil leaves, cut into ribbons

Directions:

In a large, heavy soup pot over medium-high heat, heat the oil until shimmering. Add the sausage and onion and cook, stirring frequently and breaking up the sausage with the spoon as it cooks, until the onion has softened and the sausage is browned, 4 to 5 minutes. Add the garlic and cook until aromatic, about 30 seconds, then stir in the tomato paste, oregano, basil, salt and pepper.

Add the broth, crushed tomatoes and water (swirl it around the empty tomato can to get all the tomato flavor out) and bring to a boil. Add the lasagna noodles, then reduce the heat to medium-low and cook, uncovered, stirring occasionally, until the noodles are all dente and the soup has reduced slightly, about 15 minutes. Stir in the spinach and remove from the heat.

We hope to gather every few weeks to stitch together, share stories, answer questions, make group decisions and teach new skills. It will never be too late to join us, and everyone of all ages is welcome.

After all, it can't hurt to try and figure out how we can help show each other we love one another a little better!

TACOS!

- 1. Acts of Service: I made you some tacos.
- 2. Words of Affirmation: Your tacos are delicious.
- 3. Quality Time: Let's go out for tacos tonight.
- 4. Receiving Gifts: Here's a taco.
- 5. Physical Touch: Let me hold you like a taco.
