# Mission and Peacemaking

#### Thank you UPC!

Mission and Peacemaking thanks you for your generous donations to the Mother's Day Bailout through the YWCA Community Bail Fund. The YWCA's legal services team provided the following update for us (which was also shared in worship on Mother's Day):

"Thank you again to UPC your commitment this Mother's Day. With your donation we have secured the release of Ms. F.M. who has been incarcerated at the jail since April. She was booked on one count of theft of a motor vehicle and is accused of having taken a family friend's vehicle to try to locate her children's father. The vehicle was returned to the family friend. Without your donation, she would still be in jail, because days after she was arrested, her mother passed away suddenly. Her mother was her rock, and without her, the client stayed in jail. Because of her incarceration, she missed her mother's funeral. Because of your members, she is spending Mother's Day with her daughters, and the YWCA will continue to work with her in the coming days and weeks to set up her Medicaid and other supports that she lost once in custody. Additionally, our LPC (licensed professional counselor) on staff has been lined up to help with grief counseling since she still hasn't been able to process the loss of her mom."

#### **UPC Volunteers Visit ICE Detention Center**

On Saturday, May 10, Mary Mikell, Kate Midkiff, Christine Kooi and Julie Hoffman of Unified Jewish Congregation of Baton Rouge visited migrant women held in detention at an ICE facility in Basile, Louisiana. We did so under the auspices of Louisiana Advocates for Immigrants in Detention (LA AID), a non-profit that works out of Shreveport. There are nine such ICE facilities in the state, run by private firms, housing about 7000 detainees. They are hard places, surrounded by high fences topped with concertina wire. We were only allowed to go in with our driver's licenses and some money to buy the women snacks from the vending machines. Visitors are only permitted on the weekends, and visits may last only one hour.


For all the women we spoke with, the stress and uncertainty of their circumstances were clearly wearing them down.

All the employees we dealt with were pleasant and professional. The center was clean and well kept. But it's not home, and it's not freedom.

These people need to know that they are not forgotten, that we see them as fellow human beings, and that we care. It's the bare minimum. As we are all trying to figure out the ways to live our faith in public, part of that includes the ways we engage our families, our children and grandchildren, in doing the same. The article below offers a lovely reflection about one man's decision to take his daughter to a recent political rally.

**Do justice, love mercy, bring the stuffed tiger** by **Andrew Taylor-Troutman**, Presbyterian Outlook (April 9, 2025)

Why do you take a seven-year-old to a political rally? One reason is that she is too young to stay at home alone. Another reason is that she loves art projects, so she helps make your posters. Of course, the prospect excites her. She marches around the house, waving her sign and chanting, "Fight for women! Have hope!"



Still another reason to take a seven-year-old to the rally is that the children are our future. A tariff is another word for tax, and the children will ultimately pay, just like they will for the massive tax cuts for the super wealthy that drive our national debt to astronomical numbers. Meanwhile, 40% of all children nationwide are covered by Medicaid, and one of every four kids in your county is food insecure, meaning they will suffer even more from cuts to SNAP and WIC programs. Their learning will suffer as a result of less funding for their schools and teachers. Their lives are more at risk because of less regulation of pollution in the land, skies, rivers and seas. Taking a child to a rally or protest may be the best way to remember who we fight for.

An ancient rabbi, who was no stranger to a protest and a parade in the state capital (Luke 19:28–40), commanded that everyone emulate a child's faith. Jesus could be a bit cryptic. Maybe he was referring to a child's capacity to trust or their ability to exist in the moment or that a group of them will gallop in circles in front of a legislative building like a herd of wild ponies. Maybe Jesus meant that we are to serve with our energy, intelligence, imagination and love to make our world better for all children. Perhaps he meant to kindle a belief in our cynical hearts that we are stronger together and doing the right thing matters in ways beyond our kith and kin and even beyond our wildest ken.

Yet another reason to take a seven-year-old to a political rally is that she will insist on bringing her stuffed tiger, and she will demand that you carry said tiger on your head. You will comply, and dozens upon dozens of strangers will smile at your peculiar hat. You will realize that, while the issues are serious as hell, joy offers a glimpse of heaven.
