A few weeks ago, I made my first overnight trip away from Baton Rouge. Last year, I committed to be on the 2026 Montreat Youth Conference planning team, which involves a September planning retreat weekend in preparation for the 2.5 week conference marathon in July. I was excited for the task at hand, but also apprehensive about how I would emotionally process the experience. When I returned to Baton Rouge, would it feel like home?

Moving is not new to me. Baton Rouge is somewhere between the 8-10th town I've lived in, depending on how you count. So while this part of the country is unfamiliar, transition is not.

Times like this often bring to mind a mantra I developed several years ago during yet another transition: "I'm grateful for the many places and people to whom I belong, and I look forward to feeling at home again soon." It reminds me of the gratitude I have for each community I have been part of, and tells me I am not limited to one "home." There are many people I value and many places I belong. While occasionally difficult to navigate, what a gift to know that any place can become home!

As I think about the places in which I am grounded, I am not constrained by my roots. Instead, they strengthen me to move forward to whatever comes next.

One might even say I'm rooted and reaching.

During in our stewardship season at UPC, I encourage you to think about your own life journey. How have you planted your roots, and where do you want to grow? This is also a communal question. What are the beliefs, traditions, and theologies that keep us grounded? What hopes do we have for growing into the future?

We answer these questions with where we spend our time, how we use our money, and what we think about when making decisions. The world tells us to keep our time, money, energy, and talents to ourselves. Faith instructs us to do otherwise. We hear God's call to build each other up in community, and take God's message of infinite love and abundant grace into the world. I'm excited to claim our roots and grow together.



How to Give in Realm


Log into your Realm account at onrealm.org. If you don't yet have a realm account, please contact the church office. Once you are in your profile go to GIVING then +PLEDGE and a new pledge window will appear. Choose the GENERAL FUND for 2025, fill in how often you would like to pledge, from dates 1/1/2025 to 12/31/2025, and how much you would like to pledge. Realm will calculate the yearly total for you. When you are done click SAVE PLEDGE. It's that easy!

REMINDER:

If you change your pledge and have automatic payments sent through REALM, remember to update your bank information. REALM will not automatically do that for you.

In your REALM account go to SERVING. Under SERVING you will see your "Serving Profile", "Assignments," and "Teams" information. Positive News for our Partners in Cuba

Among many of the privations experienced by our Cuban partners (and all Cubans) is declining access to electrical power. It may only be available a few hours a day or none for several days straight. The national power grid has collapsed multiple times. This means no purified water from the water treatment system, no refrigeration, no lighting after dark, no necessary medical support devices, no charging of computers and phones. Fortunately, we were able to provide our partner church with a Bluetti portable power station with solar recharging panels, which now enables them to manage the shortages. It can be charged when electricity is available and by the solar panels when not, meeting the church's electrical needs during shortages. The station was purchased by one church family and shipping was covered by another family. Thanks be to God!

Faith Formation Fall 2025

As individuals and as a church community, we are always forming and reforming our faith. It's what makes us Presbyterians and what enlivens our understanding and our response to God's love for each of us at this time and in this place.

To encourage our faith-forming journey, we offer these classes on Sunday mornings this fall.



For Children and Youth:

Babies - kindergarten: in the nursery

- 1st-7th Act Up! 2nd floor in Room 204 -Each month, this class will study a different Bible story and create a unique way to tell that story as part of our worship service.
- 8th-12th Follow Me 2nd floor in Room 206 -Fall themes for this curriculum-based class include spiritual disciplines, joy, following Jesus, and hope.

For Adults:

Bible Study

This group uses the "Living the Word" curriculum which follows the Narrative Lectionary used in worship. Themes for this fall include: "God Provides Blessings", "Encountering the Messiah", and "God's Kingdom Revealed". Class volunteers lead the round table discussion on scripture that will be preached on in worship. Meet in the Conference Room.

Bless This Mess!

This adult discussion is a class for adults who are raising young people, babies through college-age. We discuss issues and concerns that come up for "kids these days" in the context of their (and our own) spiritual formation. The format is democratic and flexible, depending on the needs and whims of those present; in the past, we have had book studies and discussed podcasts.

Digging Deeper

This class explores various topics using a lecture and discussion format. This class meets in the Parks Wilson Room near the Sanctuary.

"Welcoming the Stranger: Louisiana, America, the World"
 October 12: LA AID presentation

La-AID is a primarily volunteer-driven abolitionist organization supporting immigrants in Louisiana detention centers and the Natchez, Mississippi detention facility. Volunteers write letters to detainees, visit detention centers, and advocate for humane treatment and access to medical care. The organization is dedicated to community education, advocacy, and direct actions to improve immigrant treatment in the U.S. Note that La-AID does not provide legal advice or counsel. Interested in learning about the expansion of immigration detention in Louisiana? Want to join others at UPC in

visiting detained immigrants, assisting with their release, or becoming a pen pal for detainees? Join our class on October 12! This session also serves as the required training for those interested in volunteering with La-AID. Religion, Race—and Reparations?
 Beginning Oct. 19, Gaines Foster will lead a four-part series on Religion, Race—and Reparations?

 Beginning with the origins of American slavery in the 1600s and continuing until today, this class will provide an overview of the history of how Christians and their churches (with some emphases on the role of Presbyterian churches) supported and sometimes challenged America's racial system. It will end with a discussion of the Presbyterian Church USA's discussion of the possibility that the nation's racial past merits reparations for African Americans.

Do you ever get tired of praying in the same way? Good news - there are many different ways to pray, and some of them don't even involve words. The youth group tried these in September, so feel free to ask them for recommendations!

Doodle prayer: Write a name for God, faith attribute, or short Scripture verse in the middle of a sheet of paper. Take five minutes to "doodle" around it in whatever way makes sense to you: abstract colors, shapes, an image, repetitive pen strokes, etc.

Movement prayer: Stand in several different positions (e.g., hands to the sky, touching your toes, covering your eyes, hugging your torso, cupping your ears, hands held out in front of you). What prayerful words or emotions does it inspire?

Breath prayer: Choose a short two-part phrase to focus on. With each breath, ponder the first half as you inhale and the second half as you exhale. Repeat indefinitely. For example: (inhale) Be still and know (exhale) that I am God.

Walking prayer: Choose a person or situation to lift up to God. Walk with intention, allowing each step to ground your focus. If you can walk in a labyrinth that sets your path, even better.

Waterfall prayer: Pray with others! One person says, "Dear God," then everyone prays their own prayer all at once (with the mixing voices sounding like a waterfall). Hold the space as a group until the last person says Amen.

Presbytery of South Louisiana PW Fall Gathering

The Presbyterian Women of the Presbytery of South Louisiana held their Fall Gathering on Saturday, August 9, 2025, at Jefferson Presbyterian Church in Jefferson, Louisiana. Worship was led by Patrice Butler, Stated Supply Pastor of First Presbyterian Church of Scotlandville. An offering of \$900 was collected and donated to Living Waters for the World.

Two informative sessions were held. In the first, Kendall Cox, Director of Education for Living Waters for the World, provided an update on the organization's work in the 26 countries where water purification systems have been installed. We were honored to have Savannah and Arden Weiser, seniors at Ursuline Academy in New Orleans, as special guests. These remarkable twins shared their experiences from a school project focused on planning a water system installation in Peru, which was a highlight of the day.

In the second session, Bertha Hinojosa presented an overview of the 2025-2026 Horizons Bible Study, "Finding Resilience, Joy, and Our Identity in Jesus Christ." Bertha's enthusiasm was infectious as she shared the Bible Study introductory video available on the PCUSA Presbyterian Women website.

Jefferson Presbyterian Church, with approximately 50 members—most over the age of 70 or 80—hosts a food bank on two Saturdays each month, supported by friends, relatives, and members from other churches. Participants in the Gathering contributed numerous food items to support this vital ministry.

After enjoying a delicious lunch prepared by the Jefferson Presbyterian Women, attendees left feeling inspired and grateful for their warm hospitality.

Helping Hands
