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Along the way

Last month, I showed up at church the week after Epiphany and was confused to be presented with the opportunity to try three different king cakes. While I have tried king cake before on the east coast, this is not the same thing as having a Louisiana king cake. As I quickly discovered, there is stiff competition here and people have strong opinions about which is best!

I also learned there are many different flavors and textures, which led me to ask: what defines a king cake? The immediately apparent answer was the purple, green, and gold adornments. Not being from Louisiana, I asked the followup question: why are those the Mardi Gras colors?

Upon further investigation with the children and youth Sunday school class, I was delighted to learn what each color represents: purple for justice, green for faith, and gold for power. What appropriate values to uphold this month! In the face of illegal actions by ICE, questions of international sovereignty, and all kinds of actions that threaten the fabric of our society, these are things I can get behind:

Recognizing the power we hold to work for a better community, nation, and world;

Elevating voices long silenced and seeking justice for all; and

Relying on our faith to anchor us in what is true, honorable, and just.

There are days when fear, exhaustion, anxiousness, frustration, or defeat threaten to take over, but whenever I see Mardi Gras colors this season, I will find hope in the power, justice, and faith they represent. I hope you do, too.

Standing with our immigrant neighbors: food, diapers, and faith

UPCers have witnessed the violence and fear being inflicted upon our immigrant neighbors here in Baton Rouge, in Minneapolis, and in multiple other cities. We also witness the outpouring of love and protection coming from everyday people, neighbors, and our family of faith. Here in Baton Rouge we are more grateful than ever for our partnership with the Louisiana Organization for Refugees and Immigrants (LORI), who continue to seek ways to serve our immigrant neighbors in difficult times.

LORI recently established a food pantry and diaper bank just two weeks before Thanksgiving in response to growing need among refugee and immigrant families. Since then, heightened immigration enforcement has forced many families to shelter in place out of fear, leaving them without access to food, diapers, and basic necessities. Some parents shared that they were forced to use rags in place of diapers for their children.

In response, LORI stepped in to ensure families were not left alone. To date, thanks to the generosity of community partners, including UPC, LORI has supported over 550 households—representing more than 2,100 individuals—across New Orleans, Gonzales, Denham Springs, and the Greater Baton Rouge region, and are now receiving calls for support from Pointe Coupee. Through LORI's diaper bank, they have provided diapers to more than 85 children. This pantry is more than food—it is an expression of care, dignity, and faith in action during a time of uncertainty.



Lent Family Gatherings

Families with kids and youth of all ages are invited to Thursday evening activity at the church. The group will meet weekly at 6 p.m. from February 26th to March 26th. The evening will start with a simple dinner and then move to an activity based on that week's Bible passage.

What: "Lessons for Lent": Jesus uses metaphors to help us understand who He is. Families and their children (ages 5-18) are invited to explore these metaphors together during Lent, as a way to deepen our connection with the season and with each other. Dinner is provided (6:00-6:30 p.m.) followed by a short lesson and activity that loosely follows the Sunday Scripture texts.



Exciting announcement: we're looking to add a couple youth group advisors to our team! If you have been looking for an opportunity to get to know our young people, this is your chance! Youth advisors are responsible for coming to youth group (4:30-6 p.m. for three Sundays/month) and helping to plan activities as time, talents, and interests allow. Alvin Raetsch and Samantha Hartmann are our current all star advisors and would be a great resource for further questions about what being an advisor entails. Advisors must value building relationships with youth, be at least 21 years old, able to pass a background check, and complete a online child abuse prevention training. We're particularly hoping for people who don't have current 6th-12th graders at home, but anyone interested should reach out to Erin - we will always find opportunities for people willing to help.

Camp Agape: 3rd-12th graders

Camp Agape is a local camp run by folks in our Presbytery for grades 3-12 (completed). This camp is a week long (June 7-13th this year) and is held at Feliciana Retreat Center in Norwood, LA. Campers are divided into cabins by age and have lots of traditional summer camp fun, including: rock wall climbing and a zip line, archery, canoes, swimming, hiking, 4 square, gaga ball, arts and crafts, and more. Campers will use the week to dive deeper into their faith as well with either indoor or outdoor worship every day. The camp is memorable for its daily energizers and huge indoor games! Older campers experience off-site adventures like tubing and hiking to local waterfalls. Meals are eaten camp-style together outside or in the dining hall.

The price is approximately \$600-650 for the week for completed 3rd-12th grade, depending on age group. For those of you with even younger children (grades 1-3) there is also an intro "try it out" camp from June 5-7th (\$225). The deadline for registration is May 15th. 
Ferncliff Mission Team: Completed 6th-12th graders

This summer, our youth group (completed 6th-12th) is traveling to Ferncliff Camp and Conference Center in Little Rock, Arkansas to participate in their Mission Team program. In the mornings, we will participate in a variety of onsite service projects, including working in the Disaster Assistance Center, building beds for kids, or helping with the Farmstead and site maintenance. Afternoons/evenings may include a combination of continued service projects, traditional camp activities, devotions, games, and group chill time. Everyone will stay in the bunkbed-style Retreat House (including preparing our own meals) and enjoy the week together as a group.

The total trip cost for youth is \$380, which includes the program fee, staying in the retreat house, food, and transportation. Chaperones go free!
